

Analysis of the Potential Resources and Economic Opportunities of Sports Tourism

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Abstract

The article examines the historical evolution of sport and its relationship with socio-economic systems. Following the Industrial Revolution, sport developed in parallel with urbanization and the emergence of new social classes. From the late nineteenth century onward, the establishment of international organizations gave sport an increasingly global dimension. The International Olympic Committee and other institutions played an important role in promoting sport not only as physical activity, but also as a means of education, social integration, and public welfare. In the contemporary period, sport is no longer viewed merely as a form of physical activity; it has become an important factor in social integration, healthy living, and the preservation of cultural values. Technological progress and globalization have further expanded the scope of sport, transforming it into a dynamic economic sector. Within this framework, sports tourism occupies a particularly significant position. Sporting events serve as effective instruments for promoting countries, stimulating economic growth, and strengthening tourism potential. Major international sporting events, including the Olympic Games, world championships, and similar competitions, not only increase tourist flows but also enhance the international image and visibility of host countries. The growth of sports tourism is driven by expanding economic opportunities, improvements in transport and information technologies, increased leisure time, and rising public interest in healthy lifestyles. Consequently, sport and tourism have become closely interconnected sectors that mutually reinforce one another and hold a significant position in the global economy.

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Introduction

In its modern sense, the development of sport has been closely and reciprocally linked to the economic and social transformations that followed the Industrial Revolution, both as a cause and as a consequence. In the post-industrial period, sporting activities became associated with the social strata that emerged alongside increasing urbanization in society (Andrews, 2004; Slack, 2005).

The concept of sports development emerged in the late nineteenth century with the expansion of international sports organizations. Today, major international governing bodies such as the IOC (International Olympic Committee) and FIFA exert significant influence on the development of sport at the national level. The first major international initiative related to sports development is generally attributed to Pierre de Coubertin, the founder of the Olympic Movement.

Olympism represents one of the most significant examples of internationally oriented development, in which the newly established International Olympic Committee (IOC, 1894), together with the cooperating National Olympic Committees (NOCs), undertook the mission of promoting the educational role of sport for the purpose of enhancing social welfare.

In the twenty-first century, the concept of sports development has acquired an entirely new meaning as a broader vision of sustainable development. It has been conceptualized within a comprehensive framework that integrates diverse social,

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political, and economic objectives. These objectives include improving quality of life, combating social exclusion, expanding access to opportunities, promoting excellence, enhancing the efficiency and effectiveness of services, encouraging community participation, recognizing voluntary activity and citizenship values, supporting lifelong learning, eliminating organizational barriers, and protecting the environment.

Sports activities continue to be reorganized in accordance with changing social conditions and the evolving demands of time. Toward the end of the twentieth century, rapid technological advancement contributed to the emergence of new global models and lifestyles. Alongside these transformations, the meaning of labor and work also changed, resulting in a significant increase in people's leisure time. This growing leisure culture became increasingly shaped by motivation-driven patterns of consumption and by new forms of sports activities designed for individuals leading more sedentary lifestyles due to technological progress. Consequently, sport has evolved beyond mere play or entertainment and has increasingly become an object of consumption. By adapting rapidly to changes within the capitalist system, sport has enabled the more intensive utilization and commercialization of leisure time.

In the contemporary world, globalization has led to rapid and multidimensional changes and developments across many sectors. Like any complex phenomenon, globalization produces both positive and negative effects. The field of sport has also been significantly influenced by globalization, with its impact being evident across all components of the sports industry and culture (Senem & Özbek, 2014, p. 489).

As a social institution, sport has gained an increasingly significant place within social communities, particularly in the economic and cultural spheres. Consequently, it has become necessary to analyze and evaluate this social phenomenon from economic and social perspectives within the context of the changing world order. At this point, the widespread expansion of sport clearly demonstrates that, in a globalized world, it functions both as an influencing factor and as a phenomenon influenced by numerous sociological processes (Talimciler, 2002).

Literature Review

Sport tourism has emerged as one of the fastest-growing sectors within the global tourism industry, combining elements of recreation, physical activity, cultural interaction, and economic development. According to the United Nations World Tourism Organization, tourism diversification through sports-related activities contributes significantly to regional development, destination branding, and sustainable economic growth. International tourism policies increasingly recognize sport tourism as an important mechanism for stimulating investment, promoting healthy lifestyles, and enhancing international visibility (UNWTO, 2016; UNWTO, 2017).

The conceptual foundations of sport tourism have been extensively explored in international academic literature. Heather J. Gibson defined sport tourism as leisure-based travel involving either active participation in sports or attendance at sporting events. Gibson (2003) emphasized that sport tourism creates multidimensional experiences that combine entertainment, travel motivation, and destination consumption. Similarly, Weed (2003) argued that the integration of sport and tourism policies remains insufficient in many countries due to institutional fragmentation and limited strategic coordination between tourism authorities and sports organizations.

Several scholars have examined the socio-economic role of sport tourism in regional and national development. Ross (2001) highlighted that sport tourism enhances destination competitiveness by attracting visitors, generating employment opportunities, and increasing local revenues. Scarrott (1999) further emphasized the importance of tourism information systems and marketing strategies in promoting sports destinations. In addition, Towner (1996) analyzed the historical evolution of recreation and tourism, demonstrating how leisure travel gradually transformed into specialized tourism segments, including sport tourism.

The relationship between sport tourism and marketing communication has also received considerable scholarly attention. Ünüsan and Sezgin (2005) argued that strategic marketing communication is essential for promoting tourism products and increasing destination attractiveness. Likewise, Tolungüç (2000) stressed that advertising and promotional campaigns significantly influence tourist behavior and destination image formation. In the context of sports marketing, Ünal and Ekici (2011) emphasized that social sport marketing contributes to public engagement, social cohesion, and sports participation. Yavaş (2005) additionally demonstrated that sports organizations and clubs increasingly rely on marketing strategies to strengthen their economic sustainability and public visibility.

Research conducted in Türkiye and other regional contexts has provided important empirical insights into sport tourism practices. Yeşil (2015), in a study focusing on Antalya, identified infrastructure quality, event organization, and destination management as key determinants of sport tourism development. Sarı (2010) examined the role of travel agencies in promoting domestic tourism and concluded that public relations strategies significantly affect tourist preferences and destination loyalty. Yetim (2000) and Yılmaz Kaplan and Akkaya (2014) also explored the sociocultural dimensions of sport, emphasizing its role in national identity formation, social integration, and cultural development.

In the Azerbaijani context, tourism scholars have increasingly addressed the strategic importance of tourism development and management. Kasumov (2012) examined the structure and dynamics of the international tourism market and emphasized the growing importance of competitive tourism policies. Mammadov (2013) analyzed the regional characteristics of tourism market formation and management in Azerbaijan, noting that tourism development varies significantly across regions due to differences in infrastructure, investment, and institutional support. Furthermore, Mammadov (2015) specifically investigated the development prospects of sport tourism in Azerbaijan and highlighted the country's favorable natural conditions, international sporting events, and growing tourism infrastructure as important advantages.

Additional Azerbaijani research has focused on the broader foundations of tourism development. Soltanov (2015) discussed the overall development of tourism in the Republic of Azerbaijan and emphasized the role of state policy, international cooperation, and infrastructure modernization in expanding tourism potential. Similarly, Bilalov and Gulaliyev (2015) examined the theoretical and practical foundations of tourism management and argued that sustainable tourism development requires effective planning, investment, and human resource management.

Contemporary studies published in the journal *Science, Education and Innovations in the Context of Modern Problems (SEI)* have also contributed to understanding the relationship between sports activities, education, and organizational management. Bekai et al. (2026) explored organizational flexibility in sports management and found that adaptive management approaches improve operational efficiency within sports facilities. Allaoua et al. (2025) demonstrated that recreational sports activities positively influence students' psychological adjustment and social interaction during physical education classes. Similarly, Afrit et al. (2026) identified the important role of physical education and sports in improving motor coordination among secondary school students, while Rahmouni et al. (2026) emphasized the contribution of school sports activities to health education and public awareness.

Despite the growing body of literature on tourism and sports management, several gaps remain evident. Most existing studies primarily focus on economic impacts, marketing strategies, or educational dimensions, while comparatively limited attention has been devoted to the integrated relationship between sport tourism, destination sustainability, regional competitiveness, and institutional coordination in developing countries. Furthermore, there remains a lack of comprehensive empirical research specifically examining the strategic development of sport tourism in Azerbaijan within the broader framework of international tourism trends and sustainable development policies.

Therefore, the present study aims to contribute to the existing literature by examining the role of sport tourism in regional development, tourism diversification, and socio-economic sustainability, with particular attention to contemporary challenges and opportunities in Azerbaijan and comparable tourism destinations.

Methodology

This study employed a qualitative and descriptive research design to examine the role of sport tourism in regional development, tourism diversification, and socio-economic sustainability. The qualitative approach was considered appropriate because it enables an in-depth understanding of the theoretical, social, economic, and institutional dimensions of sport tourism based on existing academic literature, policy documents, and comparative analyses.

Research Design

The research was conducted using a systematic literature review and document analysis method. Academic books, peer-reviewed journal articles, international tourism reports, and institutional publications related to tourism, sports management, marketing communication, and regional development were examined. The study particularly focused on publications discussing sport tourism development, destination management, tourism marketing, recreational activities, and sustainable tourism policies.

Theoretical and empirical studies published by international organizations such as the United Nations World Tourism Organization, as well as research indexed in international academic databases, were analyzed to establish the conceptual and analytical framework of the study. Special attention was also given to Azerbaijani and regional studies in order to evaluate local tourism development practices and sport tourism potential.

Data Collection

The data used in this study were obtained from secondary sources. These sources included:

- Academic books related to tourism and sports management;
- Peer-reviewed scientific journal articles;
- Master's theses and institutional reports;
- International tourism policy documents;
- Publications concerning tourism marketing and regional development.

The selected literature covered both international and regional perspectives on sport tourism. Studies from Azerbaijan, Türkiye, and other international contexts were included to ensure comparative and multidisciplinary analysis. Relevant literature published between 1996 and 2026 was reviewed to examine both historical developments and contemporary trends in sport tourism research.

Data Analysis

The collected data were analyzed using thematic content analysis. Thematic categories were developed according to the major research themes identified in the literature, including:

1. Conceptual foundations of sport tourism;
2. Economic and social impacts of sport tourism;
3. Tourism marketing and destination promotion;
4. Sports management and organizational flexibility;
5. Sustainable tourism development;
6. Regional tourism policies and infrastructure development.

The analysis process involved identifying recurring concepts, theoretical approaches, and empirical findings across different studies. Similarities and differences among international and regional research findings were comparatively evaluated to identify major trends, challenges, and research gaps.

Reliability and Validity

To increase the reliability and academic validity of the study, only credible and scholarly sources were used, including peer-reviewed journal articles, university publications, and official reports from recognized international organizations. The inclusion of multidisciplinary literature from tourism, sports management, economics, and education contributed to a broader and more balanced interpretation of the subject.

Furthermore, comparative analysis of both international and Azerbaijani studies enhanced the contextual validity of the research and allowed for a more comprehensive understanding of sport tourism development within different socio-economic environments.

Ethical Considerations

The study did not involve human participants, surveys, interviews, or experimental procedures. Therefore, ethical approval was not required. All sources used in the research were properly cited and referenced in accordance with APA 7th edition academic standards to ensure academic integrity and avoid plagiarism.

Discussion

The findings of this study demonstrate that sport tourism has evolved into an important component of the global tourism industry, contributing not only to economic growth but also to social development, cultural exchange, and destination branding. The reviewed literature indicates that the growing integration of sport and tourism is closely associated with globalization, technological development, and changing lifestyle patterns. As emphasized by Heather J. Gibson and other scholars, sport tourism has become a multidimensional phenomenon that combines recreation, entertainment, travel, and economic activity.

The analysis also shows that major sporting events significantly contribute to tourism development by attracting international visitors, increasing tourism expenditures, and strengthening the international image of host countries. International events such as the Olympic Games and the FIFA World Cup have demonstrated that sport tourism can stimulate infrastructure development, increase employment opportunities, and support destination competitiveness. In this context, the findings are consistent with previous studies highlighting the economic and promotional benefits of sport tourism.

Another important finding is the growing role of marketing communication and digital technologies in the development of sport tourism. Modern tourists increasingly seek personalized and experience-based travel opportunities, while social media and digital platforms influence destination selection and tourist behavior. Consequently, tourism destinations must adopt innovative marketing strategies and modern management approaches to remain competitive in the international tourism market.

The study further indicates that Azerbaijan possesses significant potential for the development of sport tourism due to its international sporting events, tourism infrastructure, and favorable geographical conditions. However, the literature suggests that sustainable development in this field requires stronger institutional coordination, long-term strategic planning, and effective international promotion. Greater investment in infrastructure, digital promotion, and tourism management may further strengthen the country's position within the global sport tourism sector.

Overall, the discussion confirms that sport tourism represents an important strategic instrument for sustainable tourism development, economic diversification, and international visibility. The increasing global interest in sports-related travel suggests that sport tourism will continue to expand and play a more influential role in the future development of tourism destinations worldwide.

As a result of technological developments, especially in recent years, people have become increasingly sedentary in their daily lives, making sport an essential component of a healthy and high-quality lifestyle. On the other hand, the historical roots of each society are connected with different forms of sport, and in the modern period, sporting activities also serve as a means of preserving and sustaining cultural heritage. It would therefore be insufficient to define sport merely as a physical activity that benefits bodily health. Individuals who engage in sport are also considered to be psychologically healthier, and the opportunities for socialization created by sporting events have made sport an important necessity at the societal level. Sport develops and spreads in accordance with the socio-economic conditions and opportunities available within societies. As a consequence of globalization, it can be argued that sport makes a significant contribution to the expansion of a shared cultural sphere among societies. As a result, different types of sport have moved beyond being phenomena limited to specific geographical regions and have spread across the world, reaching a globalized level in terms of both athletes and spectators (Atasoy & Kuter, 2005).

Through the position it has gained within social life and public culture, sport can be regarded as having the potential to play an important role in shaping major ideologies and promoting social welfare. Globalization, in turn, accelerates these processes and expands the economic and industrial dimensions of sport in terms of production, marketing, and consumption, thereby increasing its share in the global economy (Talimciler, 2008).

Sports tourism is a new form of tourism that responds to changing expectations and needs within the tourism sector, particularly in developing countries. Countries are making considerable efforts to develop their sports tourism potential, while tourist destinations seek to increase interest in sports tourism by focusing on various aspects of sporting activities (Yıldırım, 2021).

In 2019, the share of the tourism sector in the global economy exceeded 10%, with an annual growth rate of approximately 4–5%. The growth rate of sports tourism within the tourism sector was reported to be around 14% (World Tourism and

Travel Organization, 2020). These figures demonstrate the strong dynamics and expanding potential of sports tourism. Considering the global expansion of the sports economy, it is not easy to define the boundaries of sports tourism, which combines sport and travel. On the one hand, sport makes a significant contribution to the diversification of tourism services, which represents one of the main challenges for tourist destinations, through a variety of sporting activities. On the other hand, the existence of sporting events that can be organized throughout the year contributes to extending the tourism season on a year-round basis.

Projections based on macro-level factors such as technological and economic development, as well as changes in the global population structure, indicate that tourism-oriented travel and related expenditures are expected to increase significantly. According to the forecasts of the United Nations World Tourism Organization (UNWTO, 2016), the number of tourists is expected to grow by an additional 43 million annually, reaching 1.8 billion people participating in tourism activities worldwide by 2030. The United Nations World Tourism Organization (UNWTO, 2017) also notes that demand for tourism experiences based on individuals' personal preferences is increasing. As a result, travel motivated by sporting activities has also shown a growing trend. While in the past sports-related travel was largely limited to sports delegations or teams, today it reaches much broader segments of society. The rapidly increasing number of sports tourism participants, whether as athletes or spectators, as well as the quality of sporting events and the facilities where they are held, will become one of the key factors determining the direction of such travel (Ministry of Youth and Sports, 2023). Sports tourism, particularly in connection with major sporting events, has become an important area of economic activity since the 1980s. The successful implementation of strategies aimed at attracting and informing large audiences at international sporting events is closely linked to the application of modern management approaches within the field of sport (Kurudirek et al., 2017). International sporting events represent a significant source of motivation for tourists seeking diverse services and experiences. Within this framework, sports associations and organizations have become one of the fastest-growing and most dynamic components of event tourism. In the contemporary period, such events exert a considerable influence on the development and marketing of many countries and cities.

Sports events such as the Olympic Games, the FIFA World Cup, the UEFA European Championship, Formula 1, the Tour de France, and the Wimbledon Tennis Championships, which rank among the world's leading events in terms of scale and prestige, continue to expand in terms of recognition as well as athlete and spectator participation. At the same time, the number of sporting events organized worldwide has steadily increased, while their quality and scope have also broadened. Whereas the number of such events was around 60 in the 1990s and rose to 80 in the 2000s, today more than 180 international-level sporting events are organized globally.

Major sporting events such as the Olympic Games and world championships make a significant contribution to national economies, particularly to the development of tourism, in terms of branding, infrastructure development, and other economic and social benefits. During the 2016 Rio de Janeiro Olympic Games, tourist expenditure reached approximately USD 12 billion (Ministry of Youth and Sports, 2023).

Organizations, economic structures, cultures, and traditions encompass a wide range of areas of interest. On the one hand, by ensuring the flow of information in these fields, they contribute to the formation of a positive image in the global public sphere. On the other hand, they may create transformative opportunities that help neutralize the political activities of various interest groups, the proposals emerging from such activities, and the related pressures. In order to fully achieve the expected outcomes of promotional activities, it is necessary to implement directly interconnected promotional measures in the political, economic, social, and cultural spheres within an integrated and systematic framework (Tolungüç, 2000, p. 13).

Tourism and advertising are inseparable concepts. For this reason, all properly implemented advertising and promotional activities have a positive impact on the tourism industry. Cultural, political, economic, and tourism-related promotional initiatives should therefore be interconnected and complementary to one another (Sarı, 2010, p. 67). Promotional activities carried out in areas such as tourism, nature, sport, culture, archaeology, the sea, and sun tourism, which collectively shape a country's tourism potential, aim not only to inform potential tourists about tourism infrastructure and key attractions, but also to create a positive image of the country and its tourism destinations (Ünüsan & Sezgin, 2005, p. 32).

It should be emphasized once again that sports tourism is an important instrument for promoting countries and cities internationally, accelerating economic development, strengthening infrastructure services, and enhancing international competitiveness. A country's image in the tourism sector is positively influenced by the timing, location, and visual quality of the events it hosts. At the same time, promotional activities carried out on international platforms may lead to an increase in the number of visitors to the country in the future. Sports tourism can extend the active period of domestic tourism to twelve months, strengthen its sustainability, and create significant opportunities for the effective promotion of the country (Ünüsan & Sezgin, 2005).

Since sporting competitions and athletes are among the most widely followed and highly engaging subjects worldwide, the interactions established through millions of social media connections by teams and athletes visiting our country for training camps will make a significant contribution to the formation of an image of our country as a safe and well-developed destination for sports tourism (Ministry of Youth and Sports, 2023).

As noted above, since the 1990s, sport and tourism have been recognized as two sectoral phenomena that mutually support one another. In recent years, this relationship has become even deeper and more clearly observable. Scientific studies aimed at identifying the existence and nature of this phenomenon began in Europe in the 1980s and became widespread in Asia, America, and Australia during the 1990s. Since 1993, the *Journal of Sport Tourism* has been

published by a specialized organization operating in Canada, the International Sports Tourism Council. In addition, this topic has gradually gained increasing importance in journals such as *Vacation Marketing* (Gibson, 2003).

The findings presented in Table 1 demonstrate that sports tourism is a multidimensional sector that contributes simultaneously to economic growth, destination promotion, cultural integration, and sustainable development. The literature indicates that successful sports tourism policies require integrated management approaches combining infrastructure investment, digital promotion, strategic governance, and international marketing. Furthermore, the increasing global demand for experience-based tourism suggests that sports tourism will continue to strengthen its position as a strategic component of the international tourism industry.

Literature reviews indicate that the development of sports tourism is often explained by societies' growing interest in this field (Weed, 2003, pp. 258–260). Bull and Weed (1999) characterized sports tourism as a rapidly expanding niche market within the tourism sector. In the early 2000s, tourism activities associated with sporting events were reported to generate approximately USD 27 billion annually in the United States (Gibson et al., 2003, pp. 181–182).

According to the Travel Industry Association of America, more than 75.3 million people traveled over the previous five years to participate in or attend a sporting event as spectators. Large-scale sporting events such as the Olympic Games and the FIFA World Cup are among the major events that attract mass public attention. A study conducted in North America indicated that sports tourism accounts for approximately 25% of total tourism expenditures. Against this background, investments directed toward sports tourism have also increased. One notable example is the Walt Disney Company, which invested USD 200 million in the Wide World of Sports complex in Orlando. In addition to Disney's sports complex, a theme park titled "Olympic Spirit" was established in Munich, Germany; a football-themed park was being developed in Salzburg, Austria; and a proposal was introduced in France for the creation of a park dedicated to healthy living (McGehee et al., 2003, pp. 305–307).

When examining the development and popularization of sports tourism, it can be observed that this process is mainly influenced by three key factors: economic factors, technological factors, and value- and attitude-related factors (Ross, 2001, pp. 4–6).

Economic factors are associated with the increase in the financial resources that individuals in the target market allocate to sporting activities. Particularly in developed countries, the reduction of working hours and the growth of leisure time encourage people to participate in sports activities. Marketers of sporting events have also recognized this potential of sports tourism and have begun to invest intensively in this field.

Another important factor influencing the development of sports tourism is technological progress and innovation. Rapid improvements in transportation systems have facilitated travel, while technological innovations and advances in sports equipment have made a significant contribution to the expansion of sports tourism. In addition, developments in media technologies have contributed to the popularization of sporting events. For example, the live broadcasting of Formula 1 races on one of the television channels in our country at a certain period led to the formation of viewing habits among specific segments of society.

The final factor driving the development of sports tourism is the change in values and attitudes (Weed, 2003, pp. 258–259). Societies that have reached a certain level of income and education today tend to engage in recreational (Scarrott, 1999, pp. 6–9) and hedonic activities during their leisure time. In addition, the desire for self-affirmation and self-realization is among the key motivations stimulating sports tourism. Various international and national organizations operate to ensure the more effective development of sports tourism worldwide. Some of these organizations function on a non-profit basis, while others operate according to commercial principles, contributing to the structuring and coordination of sports tourism. One of the leading non-profit organizations in this field is the National Association of Sports Commissions (NASC). This organization serves as an international cooperation platform that brings together sports commissions, sports tourism destinations, organizers of sporting events, and other stakeholders operating within the sports industry. The main objective of the association is to promote sports tourism and sporting events as strategic areas of activity that contribute to the social, cultural, and economic development of society. As a result of NASC's activities, the principles of sustainable development, social integration, and the preservation of cultural diversity are increasingly taken into account in the planning and organization of sporting events in many countries. In addition, the organization supports the efficient use of resources in sports tourism destinations, the optimization of infrastructure, and the enhancement of the economic value of sporting events. NASC also promotes the application of innovative approaches and data-driven decision-making in the management system of sports tourism.

Rapid technological changes in the modern tourism industry have significantly influenced visitors' behavioral patterns and decision-making processes.
